#### **OUR TEMPLE**

My Brethren: it only seems right that in one's exploration of the history of Freemasonry, one should start at the very beginning. In our profession, however, that once though simple inquiry has in reality a complex and convoluted answer. Although some historians and other philosophies of history contend Masonry began as far back as in prehistoric times, recorded or documented history began around the time of the building of the first temple; and as such it is now almost universally accepted by the great mass of the Masonic fraternity that Masonry began with the building of the Temple.

As received by the body of the Craft it goes as follows:

When Solomon was about to commence the building of his Temple, and his knowing that his people were not experienced architects, called upon his friend Hiram the monarch of the neighboring Kingdom of Tyre, for assistance. Hiram, in complying with his request, sent many workmen, both Masons and carpenters to Jerusalem. Their leader was a noted artist who was called, as a mark of esteem, Hiram Abif or Hiram, the father.

As legend and accounts slightly vary, King Solomon then proceeded to organize the workman, by skill level, into classifications. He presided as Grand Master at Jerusalem, King Hiram acted in the same type of position in Tyre, and Hiram Abif was in general charge as Master of the work. A slight variation shows Hiram Abif as Deputy Grand Master in Solomon's absence and to that of Senior Grand Warden when the King was present. Historically, the number of workmen necessary to build the Temple varies greatly. One learned scholar set the number of Master Masons at 3600, all of whom conducted their work according to King Solomon's directions; eighty thousand hewers of stones in the mountains were said to be Fellowcraft, and seventy thousand laborers who were not Masons, and thirty thousand laborers or entered apprentices. The more generally accepted numbers come to us from the Revival period if 1717 which states that there were 153,300 workmen employed in the building of the Temple. Three thousand three hundred were overseers; who at the completion of the Temple were advanced to the rank of Master Masons. The remaining workmen were divided 80,000 Fellowcrafts and 70,000 Entered Apprentices. At the building of the Temple only three Master Masons existed who were in possession of the secrets of the third degree; Solomon, King of Israel, Hiram, King of Tyre and Hiram Abif, the Master of Workman.

Most interestingly the claim that Freemasonry took its origins at the building of the Temple is without any historical authority. It as easily could have come from either Nimrod who was Grand Master during the building of the Tower of Babel, or Egypt under the great geometrician, Euclid. Nonetheless, the Temple of Solomon was exclusively selected by Freemasons as the cradle of our Order. As a symbol, it remains both important and interesting.

GERALD RUDOLPH FORD (1913 - 2006) Thirty-eighth President (1974 - 1977)

#### MASONIC RECORD

Initiated: September 30, 1949, Malta Lodge No. 465, Grand Rapids, Michigan, along with his half-brothers Thomas Gardner Ford (1918-1995), Richard Addison Ford (1924-) and James Francis Ford (1927-). The Fellowcraft and Master Mason Degrees were Conferred by Columbia Lodge No. 3, Washington, D.C., on April 20 and May 18, 1951, as a courtesy to Malta Lodge. Brother Ford was made a Sovereign Grand Inspector General, 33°, and Honorary Member, Supreme Council A.A.S.R. Northern Jurisdiction at the Academy of Music in Philadelphia, on September 26, 1962, for which he served as Exemplar (Representative) for his Class. Brother and President Ford was unanimously elected an Active Member of the International Supreme Council, Order of DeMolay and its Honorary Grand Master, at its Annual Session held at Orlando, Florida, April 6-9, 1975; Brother Ford held this post until January 1977, at which time he became a Past Honorary Grand Master, receiving his Collar and Jewel on October 24, 1978 in Topeka, Kansas, from the Hon. Thomas C. Raum, Jr., Grand Master, Order of DeMolay.

How many of you recall when Jackie and Mary Woldering used to bring their young children to lodge family events? Do you remember the evening when daughter, Ruth, and another young lady entertained us with their musical prowess?

Not to be outdone by his older sister, Thom Woldering was also in Naval Junior ROTC at Euclid High School. During his senior year there, he was the commanding officer. Like his sister, Thom wanted to attend the Naval Academy but his eyesight hindered him. He accepted a scholarship to Virginia Polytechnic Institute (VPI), one of the 2nd tier of military schools. He is studying engineering, hoping to work on nuclear reactors on aircraft carriers. This past August, Thom headed for San Diego for summer training in surface nuclear aboard the USS Ronald Reagan.

If both Jackie and Mary Woldering now walk a little taller and straighter with an extra 'spring' in their step, they well deserve it. "And now you know the rest of the story".
