By order of President George W. Bush, Dr. Gregg Rickman (son of Charlotte and Rick) was appointed as the 1st Special Envoy for Monitoring and Combating Anti-Semitism. This position was created by the Global Anti-Semitism Review Act, and is a position which will be housed in the U.S. Bureau of Democracy, Human Rights, and Labor.

The oath of office was administered on May 22, 2006 by U.S. Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice in the Treaty Room in Washington, D.C.

In attendance at the 'swearing in' ceremony was Dr. Rickman's wife and children, his parents, Bro. Rick and Charlotte, and a number of dignitaries. Among them were Ohio Senator George Voinovich who played a vital role in creating this position, and Congresswoman Debbie Wasserman Schultz.

Don't Pass UP the Test!

I had been one of those men who had not seen a doctor unless something was clearly bothering me - sort of a health laissez faire approach - a "guy thing". Last summer, in the course of some minor dental surgery, I was told that my blood pressure was somewhat high and that I should see a physician. Tests confirmed that diagnosis and I was put on the usual blood pressure (and cholesterol) medication. The tests also indicated that I had a high PSA (Prostate-Specific Antigen) result indicating some form of prostate problem, and I was told to see a urologist. Although I was not experiencing any of the "usual" symptoms, I eventually found my way to the urologist's office. After further examination and extensive testing, I was told that I had prostate cancer. No discomfort - no difficulties - no pain - but I had prostate cancer.

My doctor, my wife, Patsy, and I discussed the various alternative treatments of this condition and I chose to go through radiation therapy. I was then referred to an excellent radiation oncologist at the Cleveland Clinic and began my treatments late in March. After eight weeks of Monday through Friday treatments, I have finished the process and we are now awaiting the results of my getting "zapped" on a regular basis. Until now, I have not generally publicized my condition, but I do thank those who were 'in the know' for their concern and good wishes.

Patsy and I did a lot of reading about prostate cancer - literature is readily available on the Internet as well as in bookstores. It helped us to make the decision as to the manner of my treatment. This form of cancer is not generally considered to be aggressive and is very treatable, if found early.

This brings me to the purpose of this message - You might feel healthy as a horse, symptom-free and, yet, be totally unaware that your body is under attack. Before this all began, I laughed when a friend asked me about my PSA - I thought nothing of it and went on my way. Please don't follow my example. Have your PSA tested on a regular basis - make that your "guy thing". It will be healthy decision to make.

From Our *Soon to be Traveling* Webmaster

This is my 2nd of a series of upcoming travels to foreign sites. Beginning June 11th thru June 22, 2006, my wife, Beverly, our children, and I will be journeying to the State of Israel. This trip has been in the planning stages since my kids started Hebrew School many years ago. At that time we decided to enroll in the **Gift of Israel Program**. This program is a joint effort sponsored by the Cleveland Jewish Federation and local Temples and Synagogues. Through this program, children are able to have a fully paid up trip to Israel in seven years. Here is how it works: You enroll in the program and place some seed money into an account. In our case the amount was only \$150.00. We made additional payments, in our child's name, to the account, and after seven years our total payment was nine hundred dollars (\$900.00).

My Synagogue and the Federation matched my payments as long as my child remained in Hebrew School. The final amount available in my situation was \$2,450.00 per child. Not bad for a \$900.00 investment.

We will be traveling with a group from B'nai Jeshurun Congregation and their senior rabbi, Rabbi Steven Weiss. We have an action packed itinerary, and you may track our progress and also see photos the day they were taken by visiting www.keshetisrael.co.il.

Regarding the humanitarian trip to Mexico of which I wrote in the last bulletin, plans are moving ahead according to schedule. We were finally informed of the location in Mexico where our eye clinic would be set up, and where we would be fitting glasses for so many underprivileged people. Up to this time, based upon the number of shots I received, I was certain we were going into the Mexican jungle.

Actually, we will be in Saltillo, Mexico, in the province of Coahuila, with a population of about 600,000 people. Saltillo was founded in 1577 by the Spanish; is the 20th largest metropolitan center in Mexico; and is the oldest city in northern Mexico. One of their best known exports are the brightly colored sarapes. They have been affected by NAFTA significantly, so that both Daimler Chrysler and General Motors have major manufacturing plants located within the city limits. While once considered the Athens of Mexico, it is now referred to as the Detroit of Mexico.

I have contactd the Grand Lodge of Coahuila to see if I might visit a Lodge there. Thus far I've had no reply. **More to follow...**

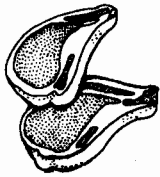

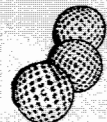

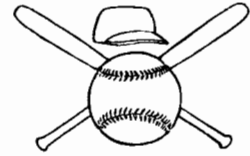

Editor's note: Frequently in our Lodge bulletin, you have noticed significant mention made of our sister Lodge in Toronto, Canada, namely Mosaic Lodge. Forest City Lodge brethren have made numerous visits north to Mosaic, and similarly the Brethren of Mosaic Lodge have journeyed south quite often to visit with our Lodge. Some of you may have wanted to know a little more about our sister Lodge. Brother Sheldon Kofsky is the Lodge Historian for Mosaic, and he has graciously sent us this brief history of their Lodge.

History of Mosaic Lodge No. 559 G.R.C.

*(Instituted as Palestine Lodge No. 559 G.R.C. in June of 1920)
from the Seventy-fifty Anniversary Booklet*

In the first two decades of the Twentieth Century, there was considerable objection to accepting Jews in existing lodges. As a result, Bro. Arthur Brookstone, with the assistance of three Past Masters of Alpha Lodge No. 384, saw the necessity for a Lodge for people of the Jewish Faith. In 1913 the Mount Sinai Lodge was formed as a Lodge for members of the Jewish Faith and Bro. Brookstone later became one of the founding members of Palestine Lodge No. 559

The year 1920 marked the beginning of the Flapper Era, and the merger of the Royal North-West Mounted Police and the Dominion Police to form the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

Around this time a remarkable resurgence in Masonic interest was also taking place when many young men returning from war, began to join various Lodges. Among the new lodges formed at this time was Palestine Lodge No. 559.

On January 28, 1920 Palestine Lodge became a Masonic entity and thus began a saga of Masonic dedication that was to follow unimpeded by time.

The first Regular Meeting of the Lodge took place at the Masonic Temple Building at 888 Yonge St., Toronto, on February 25, 1920, with twenty-one officers and members, together with thirty-eight visiting brethren present. By the end of the first year, the lodge could boast a total eighty members and was showing every indication of a successful future.

At the close of the first year, it was considered in the best interest of the Lodge, for the W.M. (W.Bro. E. J. Redpath) and the other officers to remain in the post for another term. By doing so, it was felt that the officer corps would be strengthened and a solid foundation on which to build a strong and vibrant Lodge would be created. There followed decades of growth and Masonic fraternity with a goodly portion of Charity.

A formal notice came before the Lodge on November 24, 1993, following which a petition was made to the Grand Master for permission to change the name of the lodge to Mosaic Lodge No. 559 G.R.C. This was approved in time for the Ceremony of Investiture and Installation of Officers on September 22, 1994, the commencement of the lodge's Seventy-Fifth year.

Thus a remarkable and wonderful era in Masonic achievement ended after approximately 74 years, and a new future awaited the brethren of the Lodge under the name, Mosaic.

Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Ohio Visitation
