Reflections on 200 Years of Masonry in Ohio

As the 200th anniversary of the Grand Lodge of Ohio unfolds, we celebrate two centuries of Masonry in this, our great state. Although our ability to recreate a meeting from that era may be limited slightly by the modern conveniences of a lodge building, nevertheless we can enjoy a candlelit dinner and meeting, and sport the clothing of days past to bring our minds to a simulation of that time.

We can imagine the ways our ancestors would have arrived on horseback to a far distant lodge in Chillicothe, Ohio, on a cold night in 1808, and shared a similar fellowship to that which we enjoy today. Think of what those brave Masons had to endure just to get to their lodge, 200 years ago, while you sit in your warm home on a Wednesday meeting night trying to decide whether or not to hop into the car and drive over to nearby Lyndhurst, Ohio.

Masonic fellowship is just as precious today as it was then, but you don't have to feed, water, and saddle your horse; ride many miles on its back — in the cold; bring in wood to stoke the fire when you arrive at lodge; conduct a meeting by candle and lantern light; and then ride your horse back home again in the dark and foreboding night. You simply get dressed; go to your car; turn the key; and drive to lodge to share in the warmth of your fellow lodge brothers in a comfortable lodge hall.

On many of our meeting nights, for a small price, you will receive a warm home-cooked meal prior to the meeting, and prior to leaving for home you are given hot coffee and dessert. Our brethren in 1808 would arrive home to put the horse in the barn well after midnight, while we can generally be home and in bed by 10:00 P.M. Even those of us who stay to clean up and put away the tables and chairs are generally at home no later than 11:00 P.M., ready to 'hit the sack'.

Ohio Masons of two centuries ago made it possible for you to have the lodge you now enjoy. Please honor their sacrifices and hardships by becoming an active member today!



Supposing, however, that the phone begins to ring during the conferring of a degree, or during a candidate's examination when that individual is trying so hard to relay what he has learned to the brethren seated about him.

The bottom line is that in today's world, most of us have cell phones. In most cases, the ringer can be turned off, and the phone can be made to vibrate for an incoming call. If a brother is expecting an important or even a vital phone call, try to leave the phone with the Tyler. Explain the importance of being notified, should a call come in, so that the Tyler can bring you out of lodge to receive the call. By so doing the rights of everyone can be accommodated.
